We hope that students have enjoyed a well-earned rest over the half-term holiday and have returned to school recharged and ready for the next seven weeks of learning. This half-term is always a very busy one, especially for our year 11 and post-16 students with GCSE and BTEC mock examinations, the completion of UCAS applications, Oxbridge interviews and Parents' Evenings for students in years 12 and 13.

In addition, this week we held our Post-16 Open Evening for prospective students and their families from both the current year 11 and other schools across the region. We are proud of our sixth-form provision which balances the importance of academic study with pastoral care and guidance, personal development and independence, and a rich wider curriculum to broaden and deepen students' knowledge, skills, character, and confidence and enrich their experiences. It was wonderful to welcome over 360 families and give students the opportunity to find out more about our extensive curriculum offer, which includes over 30 advanced qualifications and a range of leadership and enrichment opportunities, and to engage in discussions about their futures.

Other events this half-term include: GCSE Presentation Evening and the Music Showcase which are both being held at the King's Hall; the annual Ingleborough residential for students in all years who are involved in this year's school production, Grease; the Countdown to Christmas Concert; as well as the 'Future Fest' Careers Fayre which will give all students the opportunity to engage with a range of employers.

Having raised almost £30,000 for charity over the last two years, we will also continue our fundraising endeavours with a non-uniform day for Children in Need on Friday 17th November, as well as the Key Stage 4 and 5 Charities Week and Christmas Hamper collection. These are important aspects of our work, enabling students to actively make a positive difference to the lives of others in line with our school vision.

We look forward to another positive and productive half-term and thank you for your continued support.

Mr Calvert: Assistant Headteacher - Students' Safety

Ms. Martini: Assistant Headteacher - GCSE/A Level Examination Dates - Summer 2024

The summer 2024 examination period will begin on 9th May and will end on 19th June (GCSE) and the 25th June (A Level). Please be aware that these dates are from the common timetable, and that individual timetables will be sent to all students closer to the time.

Please also be aware that the exam contingency dates are 6th and 13th June (afternoon sessions) and 26th June (full day). JCQ guidelines state that all students must be available during these times in the event that there has been any disruption to the planned examination

schedule. Please take account of these dates when planning or booking any holidays. We strongly advise that holidays for students in years II and I3 are not booked in this period until the 27th June at the earliest.

In addition to the summer exams, the window for the GCSE and A Level MFL Speaking Component is 2nd April to 17th May. GCSE Art exams will take place 11th - 16th April and the A Level Art exam will take place from 19th - 26th April.

Year II Mock Examination - DfE Guidance

The government have released guidance on the collecting of evidence in the unlikely event that the summer examinations do not go ahead. The guidance suggests that schools and colleges should ensure students sit mock exams in exam conditions before their formal exams, and that their papers are retained. One set of mocks for this purpose is sufficient and as such, we intend to use the papers that the students will be sitting during the year 11 mock period which begins on 20th November. These mocks will be retained and used as part of evidence to determine a grade if the exams cannot go ahead.

Mr Gutch: Deputy Headteacher – Coutances





The IGS exchange with Coutances (twinned with Ilkley) has been an ongoing relationship since 1946 and so this year the exchange programme entered its 77th year and as such must be one of the longest-running exchange programmes in the country.

This year, 39 year 10 students and an additional A level student, departed at 10.30pm on the 13th October and arrived in Coutances at 5.30pm the next day and spent the rest of the weekend with their exchange partners and their families. The weather overall was kind to us when it mattered and so our visit to the world-famous Mont Saint-Michel was sunny and the guided walk onto the sandbanks (and quicksand!) which surround it, after the tour around the Cathedral was, as always, a real highlight. On Tuesday, we visited the powerful Caen Memorial Museum which commemorates the events around the Normandy Landings in World War 2 and in the afternoon the group went to the American Cemetery and Omaha beach which gives a sense of the beaches as a real place, with the cemetery providing a deeply moving reminder of the scale of the loss of human life at this point in history. On Wednesday, students spent the day in school with their partners with a final trip on Thursday to the Aquarium (revealing how deeply French culture, particularly in this part of France, is influenced by the sea) and we finished with a visit to the walled coastal town of St.Malo where students could buy souvenirs and taste a *galette* (a type of crêpe).

This exchange was an absolute pleasure to run because the overall behaviour of the students, and their willingness to throw themselves into a week living with a French family, was exceptional, and every single student was a credit to the school. Huge thanks too to Mr Hulme, Mrs Barker and Mrs McKinley for joining the trip as staff members and also to Mrs Heyworth for her administrative support, Mr Carr as the contact point at IGS and to Miss Kelly and Miss Paley-Hernandez for setting up all organisational aspects of the exchange.



During the last weekend of the half-term break, 70 IGS and students from the Skipton Academy took part in our annual Battlefields trip to Belgium. We were impressed with their maturity and the respect shown when visiting memorials to the dead. Students greatly enjoyed visiting Vimy Ridge where they were able to enter trenches and tunnels and experience first-hand the water-logged conditions of Western Front soldiers. Students paid their respects to family members by reading poems at burial sites and laying wreaths.

We also took part in the historical Menin Gate ceremony, paying our respects to all soldiers, with Jensen Mansfield, Oliver Marsh, and Annabelle Berrisford laying wreaths within the ceremony. A special thanks to Mary Goodyear, Freddie McCutcheon, Kitty Picken, and Aeryn Shipman for reading poems in dedication. Thank you to Ms. Lister and Mrs. Goodyear for their annual organisation of the trip and to all colleagues who supported! Ms. Booth














Sporting Successes and Updates




Ms Mortimer: Photography (Alumni)

On the 6th October we were absolutely delighted to welcome back ex IGS photography student Miles Charlesworth, founder of local media company Mchar. He visited school to give a lunchtime talk to an interested group of art, photography, media and business studies students about his work since leaving IGS in 2018.

Miles was always highly entrepreneurial and ran a small business taking photos and making films from year 10 onwards. When he didn't secure a place at his first choice uni for film making, he decided to go it alone and hence started running his own business aged just 18.

Miles shared examples of his work with students and talked about setting up and running his video production company, which is based locally. He shared valuable insights into starting up a small company by 'creating the work that you want to be paid for' and



Whilst he wowed us with tales of photographing fast cars and trips to Ibiza to photograph models, he also emphasised the sheer hard work of starting up as a sole trader and rarely taking a break in the first few years. One of his key tips was to always have a 'passion project' to keep moving personal learning forward and maintain interest and enthusiasm.

After the talk Miles generously stayed to answer individual questions with a small group of interested students. We are really grateful to Miles for giving his time to share his experiences and demonstrate where A levels in subjects such as art, photography, media and business can lead.

- Students at Ilkley Grammar School are permitted to submit a photograph that has previously been externally assessed for an examination, but MAY NOT submit work that is for a current exam portfolio.
- Entries must be submitted digitally by 30th November to youthcommiwrc@gmail.com.
- The photograph must be, at least, 1500 pixels in size on longest length but your email must not exceed 15Mb
- All entrants must complete a paper copy of the application form signed by a parent/carer and hand in this in to the art office on A floor

Every entrant will receive a certificate and the judges will select the winners from each category. Winners' photographs will go forward to the Rotary District Young Photographers' Competition which is judged Spring 2024. The winning photographs from the District Competition will go forward to the Rotary National Competition. The Ilkley Wharfedale Rotary Club plans to mount an exhibition of the photographs from each school and will host a prize giving ceremony at a local venue.
