We recently welcomed the Engineering Development Trust (EDT) into school to work with Year 7 students.



Students were put into teams within teaching bands I,G and S and given the RED ENTERPRISE CHALLENGE: You are a team of Roller Coaster Engineers. Your project is to design, build and test a new roller coaster ride, using only the materials provided on your table, your design can only be supported on the frame you've been given. The carriage is a marble and must continue moving along the roller coaster – the longest time recorded for the marble will be the winning team.

The aim was to have fun whilst raising the awareness and importance of STEAM subjects and how these subjects link into potential future career pathways options.

# **Year 9: Belgium Trip**

#### **ILKLEY GRAMMAR SCHOOL VISITS THE WW1 BATTLEFIELDS**



Ilkley Grammar School students have recently returned from their annual Belgium Battlefield's trip, which includes the Belgian and French Sectors of the Somme and the Belgian town of leper, in commemoration of the centenary of the war.

They set off on their 12 hour journey on the evening of Friday 25th October, stopping at Essex Farm Cemetery, a former advanced field dressing station which is now dedicated to the soldiers of Yorkshire and the wider West Riding area. The cemetery resonated deeply with the students as they talked quietly amongst the rows of stately white crosses, each one a heartfelt

remembrance of a fellow Yorkshireman. Gilbert Muirhead and Daniel Fazackerley read the poem 'In Flanders Field' written by Dr John MacCrae who was a surgeon here. In contrast, the group later visited Langemark German Cemetery, the final resting place of over 44,000 German soldiers, where overhanging trees shade the cemetery from public view. They went on to visit St Julian's Canadian Memorial at Vancouver Corner, resting place to 2,000 soldiers, and the 'In Flanders Field' museum in leper town, an educational wartime museum.

The trip also included battlefields, cemeteries and memorials in France as well as Belgium, with the group following the frontline route of The Battle of the Somme. In particular, the group visited Vimy Ridge, scene of the harrowing loss of British and French lives, which remains a memorial to the brave Canadians who took the Ridge at severe cost in April 1917 and is still surrounded by unexplored explosives. The students took in the tunnels, trenches and the impressive monument to those who fell, guided by a



Canadian student volunteer whose grandfather had fought at Vimy.

Following in the footsteps of the Somme Offensive, which began on 1<sup>st</sup> July 1916, the students wound their way through the Somme region, visiting Thiepval Memorial to the Missing, home to 72,000 missing soldiers on the Somme, where several

students sought out and discovered relatives who are recorded there. Mrs Hessey and Mr Davies also discovered family members remembered there and Alex Taylor read the poem 'The Soldier' by Rupert Brooke in honour of Mr Rignall's uncle, Harold Rignall, who is honoured on a panel on one of the impressive 'legs' of the monument.

Onward to the huge 'Lochnagar Crater' in the tiny village of La Boiselle











where ordinance laid by men of the Scottish and Irish Tynesiders caused an explosion so loud it was said to have been heard in London!

The final visit of this day in the French Sector of the Somme was a solemn journey through the village of Mametz to reach the final resting place of the Devonshire Regiment, a group of men aware that their orders would ultimately lead to their deaths but who sacrificed themselves anyway in the name of their country. They were buried in the trench and in remembrance of their bravery, Felix Weston and Josh Beevers read the

poem 'Mametz Wood' by Owen Sheers, written in their honour.

Three Year 9 students, Elodie Parsons, Josie Simpson and Zoe Haskins, laid wreaths in commemoration and respect at the 'Last Post' ceremony at the Menin Gate, a memorial to the missing soldiers of the British Empire, where a nightly ceremony commemorates their loss with sadness and respect.

The final day saw the students visit the largest British military cemetery anywhere in the world, The Tyne Cot Cemetery, with 34,000 names engraved upon walls on the back. Students visited the panel bearing the name of former IGS student and teacher Eric Fitzwater Wilkinson M.C. who was killed in action on the 9<sup>th</sup> October 1917 in Flanders aged 26. Mr Hansen beautifully recited the Headmaster's Response to the death of Eric, which was published in the school's newsletter, 'The Olicanian', shortly after being notified of his death.

Mr Khalil, who accompanied the students commented, 'It had a very solemn feeling to it' and he was deeply moved by the trip. 'It was an amazing trip that had a really positively effect on all those who went.'

Mrs Lister and Mrs Goodyear stressed the importance of the trip and noted, 'This history trip is full of memories of the battlefields and in remembrance of the thousands who died during the Great War. The behaviour of the students was impeccable and we were very proud to take them to Belgium as it is a thought-provoking trip and helps them to understand the scale of the war'. Mrs Birch and Mrs Welbourne also accompanied the trip and commented on how well our students represented themselves and the school throughout.





## **Year 11 Presentation Evening 2019**

On Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> November, we enjoyed another fantastic evening at the King's Hall in Ilkley honouring the achievements of the class of 2019. Last year's "red ties" had much to celebrate and should be very proud of their collective achievements. With the continuation of more challenging linear examinations, 245 students left with qualifications, with 82% of students achieving at least 5 grade 4s (equivalent to the old C grade) including maths and English. With an average grade across all entries of grade 6, over 40% of all grades were at grades 7-9 and almost 1 in 4 of all grades were at the highest grades 8-9, the new measure of exceptional attainment. This was another record year for IGS with a progress score of +.58 showing that, on average, students made over half of a grade more progress in every subject across the curriculum than students of a similar ability nationally.

The whole evening was another excellent showcase for Ilkley Grammar School, as students proudly collected their GCSE certificates to the warm applause of friends, family and IGS staff. It was clear that many students had again achieved their Personal Best, and the months of hard work and determination had paid dividends. Ms. Williams, Headteacher, said: "As a year group, the 2019 'Red Ties' achieved a record-breaking set of GCSE results with a wide variety of superb individual accomplishments and achievements. Once again, I was incredibly proud as Headteacher to celebrate these achievements with our students and their families at our Year 11 Presentation Evening in The King's Hall. Congratulations to the Class of 2019!"

Outstanding individual achievements were recognised in subject awards, as well as in prizes for exceptional progress and attainment across the curriculum. The exceptionally high standards at IGS, alongside the record results, meant that for every prize winner there were many others eligible for an award. Indeed, whilst there was considerable academic success to celebrate, also on display was a wide range of musical talent. There were excellent instrumental solo performances from current year 11 students, Charlotte McCarthy, Gus Lovell and Joe Rogers, as well as a powerful rendition of Pulled from The Addams Family by year 13 student, Eleanor Dear.

The evening closed with an inspirational address from the Guest of Honour, Danielle Brown, a double Paralympic gold medallist and the first disabled athlete to represent England in an ablebodied category. Danielle encouraged everyone to make the most of opportunities and to drive ourselves forward in order to take ownership of the future and maximise our potential. Her key messages included:

#### Choose the right response

You can't control what life throws at you, but you can choose your response.

#### Learn from failure


Through failure we can make ourselves better. There are positives which can be taken from any situation.

Confidence is a valuable gift. Appreciate and celebrate your achievements and invest in yourself.



## **Post 16 Autumn Seminars**

This autumn we have been very pleased to have been able to welcome a number of influential thinkers and academics to Post-16 who have so far spoken to students on topics ranging from cinematography to the climate emergency and from the legal implications of the prorogation of parliament to Charles Darwin's visit to Ilkley at the time he published Origin of the Species.



In each talk the visitor speaks for around ½ an hour on a

topic of their choice which is at the 'Cutting Edge' of their thinking and then it is opened up to the floor for discussion. At the end of the session, students consider the implications of what they have heard for their own subjects - How might one apply the theory of the 'Survival of the Fittest' to economics? What could be the implications of Brexit for scientists or geographers? What is the importance of storytelling in cinematography or what is the psychology of climate change?

These seminars are intended to encourage students and staff to think in an interdisciplinary way and to consider how different fields of study interact and influence one another.

We are very grateful to those visitors who have given up their time to come to school on a Friday afternoon and hugely impressed by the contributions of the students who attend.




## **SPORTS RESULTS**

The performance will take place at the end of May 2020 in Grassington.


