Full Opening in September 2020 – updated 2nd September (for reference)

Following the publication of <u>DFE guidelines</u> for the full re-opening of schools, we have made slight amendments to our plans for the start of the new academic year.

The government guidance provides a framework for school leaders to put in place proportionate protective measures for students and staff to minimise any risks from coronavirus (COVID-19), whilst ensuring that all students can return to school and receive a full, high quality educational experience.

In order to significantly reduce the risk of transmission, schools are required to implement the essential elements of the system of controls which include:

- a requirement that people who are ill stay at home
- robust hand and respiratory hygiene
- enhanced cleaning arrangements
- active engagement with NHS Test and Trace
- formal consideration of how to reduce contacts and maximise distancing between those in school wherever possible and minimise potential for contamination so far as is reasonably practicable

Whilst the guidance makes it clear that all schools must cover the system of controls, there cannot be a one-size fits all approach and schools are expected to make their own informed decisions about how best to balance the management of risk with the delivery of a broad and balanced curriculum. In order to minimise contact and maintain distancing wherever possible, schools are required to consider the following and then put in place the measures (as much as possible) which suit their particular circumstances:

- grouping children together
- avoiding contact between groups
- arranging classrooms with forward facing desks
- staff maintaining distance from pupils and other staff as much as possible

Such considerations are extremely challenging for schools, but are particularly so for a school of our size, with over 1900 students from September 2020, and a complicated site. However, we are determined to welcome all students back to school full-time and have used the set of principles within the system of controls to inform our planning, alongside the thorough review of our health and safety risk assessments. Whilst there cannot be zero risk to any school being open, we are confident that we will have done everything possible within the context of IGS and our existing resources to minimise the risks, in accordance with the DfE Guidance.

REDUCING CONTACT BETWEEN INDIVIDUALS AND MAINTAINING SOCIAL DISTANCING WHEREVER POSSIBLE

In order to minimise contacts and mixing between students whilst still maintaining a full curriculum for all students, we will implement the following measures:

Staggered starts and ends to the school day

To reduce overcrowding at the start and end of the school day, we will stagger the start and finishing times for different groups of students as detailed in the diagram below. There is a planned 15-20 minutes difference in the morning between some year groups to significantly reduce the number of students moving at any one time; there is a slightly staggered departure in the afternoon which is constrained by bus timings.

Staggered entrances and exits

Each year group will be allocated at least one specific entrance point to further minimise mixing between different year groups. There are 4 separate points of entry and exit onto the site which will

be supervised at the start and end of the day: The Main Entrance and Front Side Gate both accessed from Cowpasture Road (there are two separate pedestrian entrances, one by the vehicle entrance and one by the vehicle exit); the West Entrance accessed from below the bus layby on Cowpasture Road and the Bottom Gate accessed from Springs Lane.

• Increased flexibility for Post-16 students

Post-16 students will be permitted to arrive later or depart earlier if they have private study allocated at the start or end of the day, or a significant block of time in the middle of the day. They must ensure that they sign in on arrival and departure if this is outside the normal start and end of the school day, and must be on site in time for their lessons.

Staggered break times

All morning break times will be staggered to ensure that no more than 3 year groups are on break at any one time. This allows different year groups to be allocated separate catering zones and social areas as follows:

Staggered lunch times

Lunch will also be staggered to further minimise contact. To facilitate three separate lunch periods, period 4 has been extended with a total taught lesson time of 80 minutes. As can be seen from the table below, years 7 and 9 will always be on early lunch after their early break, years 8, 10 and 12 will be on middle lunch, with years 11 and 13 on the later lunch period. The year groups have been allocated the following zones which are based on their year group size rather than the main location for their lessons. For years 7-11, all zones will include a catering area with lunch service, a designated indoor area for sandwiches, as well as an outside space.

To further reduce numbers, students in years 12 and 13 will be permitted to leave the site at lunchtime but must be back in time for their lessons:

Bubbling of Students

Students will be organised into bubbles to limit the number of students with whom they come into contact. This provides an additional protective measure and makes it quicker and easier to identify those who may need to self-isolate in the event of a positive case, and keep that number to as small as possible.

Government guidance acknowledges that in secondary schools, especially at key stage 4 and 5, the bubbles are likely to be the size of a full year group to enable delivery of the full range of curriculum subjects taught by subject specialists. We have organised students as follows:

Year 7:

All lessons will be taught in tutor groups from September except technology and PE which will be taught in bands: I, G and S. Unlike previous years, maths will be taught as a tutor group for at least the first month to allow specialist maths teachers the opportunity to assess students' mathematical knowledge, skills and understanding, any gaps in their learning and individual misconceptions to allow groups to be re-arranged into ability-based sets within a band from October 2020. The maximum band size is 120.

Year 8:

Lessons will continue to be in tutor groups except for history, geography, science, maths, technology and PE when they will be taught in bands: I, G and S. The maximum band size is 120.

In both years 7 and 8, students will be organised to go to lunch and break with their tutor group and band, and will be encouraged to maintain distancing when outside with other students from their year group at social times.

Year 9:

Students will mainly be organised into half year groups: bands X and Y for over 80% (84.4%) of their timetable. However, in order to deliver the full curriculum and to ensure students are able to access all of their options lessons, the remaining 16% of the timetable will be organised across the full year group as per government guidelines.

Years 10 and 11:

In years 10 and 11, all **core** lessons in maths, English, biology, chemistry, physics, CSI and PE will be organised on the basis of students' X or Y bands. In the four options blocks, A, B, C and D, students follow a wide range of individual combinations and this necessitates year group bubbles for 40% of their timetable.

Years 12 and 13:

All groupings will be based on year group bubbles given students' different subject combinations.

Zoning of Year Groups 7-11

For years 7 to 11, we have allocated specific zones across the school site where the majority of lessons will take place. The zones are designed to spread year groups across the 3 main buildings of the school site and are as follows:

We simply do not have sufficient areas of the school to have all year 12 and 13 lessons zoned in a particular part of the school. We have designated some classrooms specifically for post-16 lessons: C1; F5; K1; T1; T2; D5-D8; the Conference Room, but other rooms in year 7 to 11 zones, as well as specialist classrooms, will also need to be used.

Post-16 students will be encouraged to wait a couple of minutes for students in years 7-11 to transfer rooms within their zone, or to specialist rooms outside of their zone, before moving on the corridors to their classrooms. Any contact with other year groups should be transitory passing contact which is deemed to be very low risk.

Where practical, year 12 and 13 students will be allowed to study at home where they have blocks of private study time. For supervised study periods, year 12 will have the upper library and year 13 the lower library.

Year 12 students will also have use of F:Hall and F6 and year 13 students will be able to use the Post-16 study area, outside the library and the Courtyard Café (except period 4).

Zoning of Toilet Facilities for Year Groups

The guidance makes it clear that different groups do not need to be allocated their own toilet blocks, although toilets need to be cleaned regularly and students encouraged to clean their hands thoroughly. We have zoned toilet facilities where possible:

One-Way Systems

One-way systems with clear signage will be introduced across the site especially in areas with narrow corridors and stairwells. Wider corridors will be clearly divided to allow ease and speed of transfer to different rooms within a zone.

• Cessation of all mixed larger gatherings until further notice

School assemblies, staff meetings and staff briefings will now take place remotely.

The combination of all of these measures will help to minimise contact between individuals and reduce movement around the site. As we communicated on Friday, with a full cohort of students returning in

September, social distancing will not be possible within classrooms or catering areas as with such precautions in place, we would only be able to have half year groups on site at any one time. Given the very low risk from Covid-19, alongside the steps we have taken as per the guidance including mandatory hygiene measures and staff maintain social distancing as much as possible in lessons, we believe we have further minimised the risk of transmission of the virus at IGS.
