COMMUNICATION CHANNELS:

SchoolComms, the school website, YouTube Channel and Twitter @ilkleygrammar – we mention these words on a regular basis but appreciate as parents you don't always know where to find information about the school and your students. Hopefully, the information below highlights the various methods of communication we use with regard to your child and school life and helps to clarify what the week ahead might hold for your son or daughter.

SchoolComms

This is the email/text system used to communicate with parents. Currently emails/texts go to Priority I and 2 parents who have parental responsibility. We can use SchoolComms to contact you through either mobile (text) or email. Corrections or amendments to contact details can be made to admin@ilkleygs.co.uk. Please keep us updated with any changes to contact details, especially mobile phones. SchoolComms is also our main contact method for any school closure, for snow days, emergency closure – before or during the school day.

SIMS Parent (data collection system)

SIMS Parent is the system we use to collect and update the latest contact details and medical information about students, we also use another simple survey system to acquire parental consents for a number of school obligations and expectations.

Attendance and Punctuality

We place a very high priority on both of these. Please encourage your child to be punctual; it is obviously very good training for future life. Our school gates close at 8.25am. Any students arriving after the gates are closed must sign in at Reception. Students are expected in Registration by 8.30am prompt. Any students arriving after this time will incur a late mark. Under school policy, 3 late marks in a timetable cycle results in an after school detention. School gates open again at 3.00pm when school finishes except Wednesday when we finish at 2.30pm.

Absence due to illness

If your child is ill or unavoidably absent, please telephone the school explaining the absence before 8.30am. This must be done on **each day** of **absence**. Our expectation is that students will achieve 97% attendance or above across the year unless there are exceptional medical circumstances. There is a very high correlation between school achievement and good attendance; we monitor this very closely and ask for you to work in partnership with us to ensure your child makes the very best of school life. Please note that all doctor or dental appointments should be made after school or in holiday time. Please call Mrs Ruth Hardaker (Attendance Officer) if you have any attendance concerns.

Absence requests during school time

School holidays account for 14 weeks of the year and parents are expected to arrange all family holidays or other events during these times. It is only the Headteacher who may authorise leave of absence during school term time and this will only be granted in very exceptional circumstances. If a request is to be made, parents must complete the 'Application for Student Leave of Absence during Term-Time' form (available from the school on the school website well in advance and before any absence is booked). Absence during term time interrupts continuity of teaching and learning and disrupts the educational progress of individual children.

EAT SMART AT IGS:

Year 7 students are not allowed to leave the site at lunchtime. Cafeteria-style facilities are available in B Hall, selling hot meals, sandwiches, snacks, baked potatoes and salads, and students will access this on a weekly rota basis. Packed lunch rooms are also available. Details of the weekly lunch rota will be published as school starts in September.

Ilkley Grammar School's catering service, Eat Smart, will provide healthy food choices to fuel active minds and bodies all day long. Our catering provision is run by the school and for the students with every penny of profit going to support the school.

Eat Smart provides a wide range of foods across the week. Variety is the key ingredient – whether it is different fruits, vegetables, grains, pulses or types of meat and fish. We create an eating experience that supports students' and parents' efforts to eat healthily based around newly designed daily menus a free fruit and salad bar.

Our fixed price menu ensures all meals are balanced and value for money and will take away confusion from students making it easier for them to make healthy choices.

Eating in school should be a pleasurable experience: time spent sharing good food with friends.

PARENTPAY:

This is the system that facilitates the money side of things! All payments for food, music lessons, trips and visits and equipment are processed through ParentPay.



Our cashless system incorporates the latest technology, eliminates the need for students to carry money throughout the day and significantly reduces the queuing that we know puts so many students off having a school lunch. The system is usually biometric using a thumbprint, but during the pandemic we have converted to a card system to support social distancing. The system also allows you to track

your child's daily diet and support their healthy eating.

Any amount of money can be paid into a student's account, and any money spent on food and drink will be deducted on a daily basis. A daily 'spend limit' of £5 is programmed into the system. This can be increased or decreased for an individual student by making a written request to the school Finance Office.

As per current legislation, we operate an 'Opt in' policy and therefore require your consent to get you and your child on the system. If you choose not to have your child registered on the Biometric System*, a 4 digit PIN Code will be allocated.

During the pandemic we will continue to issue swipe cards to pay for food in school, to support our social distancing measures.

We will register all new Year 7 students during their first week of school in September for our ParentPay system. Your activation details to enable you to set up your ParentPay account will be emailed to you early in September.





PERSONAL ORGANISATION:

Personal Property

The school cannot accept responsibility for personal property (including clothing, money, electronic goods and other valuables) which students bring to school. Students should not be encouraged to bring money to school and are responsible for their own purses/wallets and should, therefore, not leave them unattended. All personal property should be indelibly named.

Mobile phones and other expensive items are not encouraged and the school cannot accept responsibility for their loss or theft. (Please refer to the School Mobile Phone Policy on page 18). Uniform, PE kits, coats and even shoes should be named.

The lost property box is located in the Key Stage 3 Hub (smaller or more valuable items are handed in to the Key Stage 3 Hub Student Support Manager).

If your son/daughter loses anything, the sooner they go looking for it, the more likely they are to find it.



Class Charts

Class Charts is our school's reward system. The system is on-line (both web and app enabled) and you will be sent a link with log in details in September. Teachers reward and sanction through ClassCharts and also set homework. As parents you also have access to the system. The system is used to give homework and it is therefore imperative that students and parents look at it regularly.



BUSES:

These operate to and from Menston, Addingham, Burley and Keighley. Whilst travelling on the buses, students must behave sensibly and remain seated at all times, with seat belts fastened. Where there are concerns about conduct or health and safety, a student may be banned from using the school bus for a week or more. School buses are available from either the lay-by on Cowpasture Road, or on Wheatley Road.

The buses drop off and pick up points are the same, either on Cowpasture Road or Wheatley Road.

UNIFORM MATTERS:

Our uniform is sensible, practical and smart. Students are expected to wear their uniform with pride. Students will be challenged where they fall short of our high standards and sanctions will be applied if required. Students are ambassadors for the school when they are out in the community and wearing school uniform and are expected to behave accordingly.

- Blazer: black with school crest (compulsory). Available from uniform stockists. Along with the school tie, the blazer is how students are recognised as members of our school community and consequently it must be worn at all times unless for a specific, agreed reason.
- Shirt: plain, white and tucked in with top button fastened. No short, fitted shirts or blouses.
- **School Tie:** the colour of the school tie is individual to the year and is available from uniform stockists. The crest must show below the tie knot at all times. Year 7 tie is SILVER.
- **Skirt:** Traditional pleated grey or charcoal grey skirt, available from recognised mainstream stockists as well as our two recommended stockists. Skirt length should be closer to the knee than the hip. There may be a requirement to wear trousers if the skirt is repeatedly worn too short.
- Trousers: dark grey, plain and sensible style made from a suitable material such as cotton/polyester. For the avoidance of doubt it is easiest if trousers are bought from a recognised mainstream stockist of school uniform (see list below). Trousers must not be overly baggy or tight. Outside pockets, visible stitching, hipsters, flared trousers, denim and brushed cotton are not allowed. Belts must be black, plain and cannot be heavily branded.
- **Shoes**: black leather, sensible and practical in style, no trainers (even if black). Shoes must be either flat or with low heels. Students coming in to school without the correct footwear will be given black school pumps to wear.
- **Pullover:** (optional) plain, v-necked in grey with school logo. Available from uniform stockists. No non-school pullovers, jumpers, hoodies or sweatshirts may be worn at any time and will be confiscated.
- **Socks:** Plain black, grey or white. **Tights:** nude or black.
- **Coat:** If it is wet or cold students are allowed to wear a coat outside at break and lunchtime or an IGS branded hoodie over the top of the blazer. These must be removed before entering a classroom.
- **Jewellery:** only one plain stud in each ear lobe is permitted. No other facial, tongue or body piercings are permitted. If worn students will be required to remove them immediately, they will be confiscated and returned to parents. 'Retainers' worn in place of piercings, rings and bracelets are not permitted.
- **Headscarf (worn for religious reasons):** if worn this needs to be black or grey. However it can match the colour of your year group tie.
- **Hairstyle:** must not be extreme (e.g. overly short or involving shaved lines). Hair colour must be natural and not highly coloured or streaked.
- **Makeup:** this is not permitted in years 7, 8 and 9. In years 10 and 11 it must be discreet. If it is very noticeable it is not discreet.



Students can expect to be challenged where they fall short of our high expectations. They are ambassadors for themselves and for our school when they are out in the community. The 'Get Smart' message benefits us all.

Like all our expectations, it is about choice and consequence. Similarly with PE kit: students must organise themselves to bring kit to school, and will have to borrow some if they forget. Repeated failure to bring kit can also lead to sanctions and contact with home.



School Uniform: PE

Can be purchased from the uniform suppliers.

Girls' PE Kit

- White polo shirt with applicable 'Learning Community' coloured trim I Band yellow, G Band red and S Band – blue and school badge
- Black skort with school badge
- Plain black athletics or cycling shorts (optional)
- Black lycra 'skins' may be work from October to Easter
- Black hockey socks
- White sports socks
- Trainers
- Astro boots (optional)
- Swimsuit (one-piece) / towel
- Grey hoodie with school badge, available from our designated suppliers no other brand is acceptable

Optional:

Plain black tracksuit bottoms/jogging pants, plain black sport leggings.



Girls' outdoor kit has the addition of a grey hoodie.
Students can choose to have their initials included on the hoodie – definitely helps when locating missing kit!

Girls' indoor kit – notice the blue trim to the top indicating their Band – Blue is S Band



Boys' PE Kit

- Black rugby shorts.
- Reversible Rugby shirt black/red with school badge.
- Black football socks.
- Football boots plastic studded boots to use on the 3G as well as trainers for the astro-turf and indoor facilities. Metal studs will be required if chosen to play for the rugby team.
- White polo shirt with applicable 'Learning Community' coloured trim I Band yellow, G Band red and S Band blue and school badge White shorts.
- White sports socks.
- Trainers.
- Swimming trunks/towel.
- Grey hoodie with school badge, available from designated suppliers no other brand is acceptable.
- In addition, the following protective equipment is strongly recommended: shin-pads and a gum-shield (rugby only).

Optional:

Plain black tracksuit bottoms/jogging pants.



Black outdoor kit is used for rugby, football, hockey and cross-country. The top is reversible so students can play as different teams!

Indoor white kit is used for athletics, gymnastics, badminton and tennis— notice the blue trim indicating the student's band, in this case blue for S Band

PE Buses during the school day:

For games at the field, students will be told where to line up for their double PE/Games lesson and will be escorted by PE staff onto the buses in the Cowpasture Road lay- by.

Extra-Curricular Sport 2021/2022

Clubs/Training sessions

Most extra-curricular activities finish at 4.30pm. Students may choose to walk home after the session, but if they are being collected by car, please could parents/carers use the appropriate car park:

- Springs Lane car park (bottom of school) for Netball, Basketball and Badminton
- Cowpasture Road (top car park) for students returning from activities at the School Fields

Activities take place at the school sports field on Leeds Road, Ben Rhydding. Students with a Burley bus-pass should travel to the Field on their normal special bus. A hired coach transports all other students to the pitches free of charge.

At the end of the session, all students are able to catch the 'games bus' back to school, or, with parental consent (using the data form & consents booklet), may walk home directly from the Sports Field. (Alternatively, parents may collect students from the field at 4.30pm)

School Teams - 'Away' Fixtures

The minibus/coach returns to the main entrance of school, on Cowpasture Road. We therefore ask that all students are collected from the **top** car park on these occasions.

Teams usually return to school for 5.30/6pm (later for Athletics and less local events). Having a mobile phone is useful if there are any changes to the return time. When returning to school, parents/carers may prefer students to be 'dropped off' en route at an official bus stop which is close to home (e.g. in Burley, Ben Rhydding, etc). As student safety is a top priority, we must have **written confirmation** of this arrangement.

Extra-curricular Rugby

The school has very close links with Ilkley Rugby Club, and as such, often uses the Club's facilities for matches and training.

Written consent from parents is required to confirm that students are able to walk to the Club independently after school. (All journeys to the Club **during the school day** will be accompanied by staff either walking or by minibus/coach).

Keeping Safe



Medical Treatment

A child requiring first aid or other medical treatment should go to the Year 7 Hub, where they will be attended to. No child is sent home without contact having been made with a parent or nominated emergency contact. To maintain open channels of communication, it is essential that you keep the school up to date with emergency contact numbers, particularly where these may change because of new mobile numbers. If there is a medical problem, students must go through the Key Stage 3 Hub and **not** contact parents directly.

Medicines in School

The administration of medication to children remains the responsibility of the parent or those with parental responsibility. Medication should only be taken to school when absolutely essential and with the agreement of the school. Some students are subject to Individual Healthcare Plans (IHCP) through the school nursing team and other medical services and the school are involved in this process. Please can parents with children who have an IHCP contact school so we can ensure we meet the needs of the plan.

Our guidelines for the administration of medicine are:

- Where possible, it is preferable for medicines to be prescribed in frequencies that allow the student to take them outside of school hours.
- If this is not possible, prior to staff members administering any medication, the parents/carers of the child must complete and sign a parental agreement for a school to administer medicine template/form which can be found on the school website.

Risk Assessment

Students who come into school on crutches or with limited mobility must have a risk assessment carried out before they will be allowed to stay in school. This can be arranged with the appropriate Head of Year.

Bullying

The school always takes bullying very seriously. We try our very best to support the victim and work with the bully to change their behaviour. To support our policy we would ask parents to encourage students who may be being bullied to talk to someone they trust. This could be a tutor, a subject teacher or Head of Year, who will listen to them and support them. We can't help if we don't know what is happening. A copy of the Anti-Bullying Policy is available on request.



Knives or Other Offensive Weapons in or Near School

Recently there has been a great deal of media attention focused on the issue of teenage knife crime, in particular. Although West Yorkshire and Ilkley, and Ilkley Grammar School in particular, do not experience the knife culture of other areas, we are not complacent.

The Law:

- It is illegal to carry any knife if there is intent to use it, even defensively, as a weapon, even if the knife belongs to someone else.
- Police can and will search someone if they believe they are carrying a knife. Police and school staff can also search young people for weapons in school.

Carrying a knife could mean being arrested, going to court and ending up with a criminal record or even a prison sentence. We hope our students will always make the right choice by walking away if confronted with the threat of violence, and not carry a knife or other weapon themselves.

If a student is believed to be in possession of a knife or there is sufficient evidence that they have had a knife, or any other offensive weapon, the following school guidelines will apply:

- a search will be conducted
- an investigation will be instigated to gather evidence and establish facts
- where there is evidence of possession, parents/carers will be contacted and the police informed and there will be a fixed term exclusion and a possible recommendation for permanent exclusion dependent on the circumstances. The Chair of Governors will be contacted and informed

Drugs in School

Ilkley Grammar School has a clear policy on illegal substances in and in the vicinity of school and on school visits, including college placements or work experience. Students need to know that if they are found in possession of, or supplying these, parents are informed and the police are involved.

Any student suspected of being part of activities involving controlled substances (illegal drugs) or found in possession of controlled substances on school premises or in the vicinity of the school, will be subject to a detailed investigation. Where there is evidence that this is not a first offence and there are no extenuating circumstances, there will be a recommendation for permanent exclusion.

Any student found to be supplying i.e. offering to sell, giving, actually selling, obtaining on behalf of others or trading controlled substances (illegal drugs) for something of value or possessing with intent to supply another person, will be recommended for permanent exclusion. The school's view of the offence is the same whether the offence occurs on school premises or not.



Mobile Phones

These are allowed in school but their use is restricted and they must not be seen, heard or used in class. The mobile phone policy was updated recently in conjunction with the Student Council as follows:

Mobile phones can ONLY be used at lunchtime

NOT at breaktime at all (or in class / library unless with permission)

NOT inside buildings anywhere

NOT on courts

NOT when moving around / walking

NOT on stepped areas

NOT in lunch queues

Mobile phones seen or heard at any other time will result in a negative

- 3 mobile phone negatives in a half term = half an hour detention and letter sent to parents warning of possible future ban
- 3 further mobile phone negatives = detention, phone placed in hub and ban for the rest of the term



Aerosols

Aerosols can cause problems for anyone who suffers with breathing difficulties and are therefore not allowed in school. Students can however, bring roll-on deodorants to use after PE lessons.



Food Allergies

We try to ensure that Ilkley Grammar School is a nut free school and our catering team do not use nuts or other nut products. In addition, could we please request where possible, do not bring foods that contain raw nuts into school. We have a number of students with severe allergies to nuts; and this helps to safeguard them. Please contact school to discuss any serious allergies so we can ensure we can meet the needs of the young person and keep them safe.

Child Protection & Safeguarding

A team of staff led by the Designated Safeguarding Lead Mr Calvert are available to be spoken to about any safeguarding problems that may arise; this includes online safeguarding issues.







Learning and Personal Best (PB)

WHAT IS PERSONAL BEST?

We expect the best and expect to get it. All students should behave sensibly, politely and responsibly. We ask that at all times consideration and courtesy be shown to others in school and the community.



Our Personal Best structure is founded on choice and consequence and allows us to reward students and give them very clear choices about how to behave. There is a clear reward system using Class Charts and clear classroom and around school sanctions. Good discipline ensures good learning for everyone. We have a clear hierarchy of sanctions, from verbal warnings and negatives on Class Charts to detention, contracts, a day or more in our Consequences Room or even exclusions, if there are serious breaches of discipline.

The July Challenge and Celebration Week is intended to be just that: an opportunity to recognise hard work and good learning while further developing personal learning and thinking skills in an extracurricular setting. Students will be taken through these expectations the first day they are in school. Students know they have a choice about how to behave, and our expectation is that parents will work with us where there is misconduct and support us, particularly with regard to attendance and after-school detentions. A detention is some way up our sanctions hierarchy and is a serious matter. We expect very few, if any, Year 7 students in after-school detentions.

Around School Rules

- Be polite and respect the feelings of others
- Do as you are told by all staff first time and every time
- Obey all notices
- Look after property and put litter in bins
- Chewing gum, smoking, alcohol and other illegal substances are forbidden in school

Routines

- Wear your school uniform correctly at all times
- Hand in all homework on time
- Walk around the school quietly and on the left
- Eat and drink in the right places at the right time
- Only use lockers before and after school, and at designated times over break and lunchtime

Classroom Rules

- Arrive on time, fully equipped with all necessary stationery and iPad, and ready to work. Line up sensibly and quietly outside the classroom
- Stand in silence at the beginning and the end of each lesson
- Do your work to the best of your ability without distracting others
- Listen carefully when the teacher or another student is speaking
- Put your hand up and wait for permission to speak
- Only water in a clear bottle is allowed

LEARNING AT IGS:

Although it may seem like stating the obvious, schools are about learning and we quite rightly put the highest premium on academic progress and performance. We look to challenge and support students to do their very best to achieve well beyond expectation. We expect you as parents to take a keen interest in your child's classroom performance and in their progress towards subject target grades. All students have the right to learn and to achieve, and no student must be allowed to interfere with or disrupt the learning opportunities of others. If we have concerns about your child's conduct and learning attitude, then we will contact you immediately. Similarly, where students are doing well, we will celebrate with you.

iPads for Learning

Our eLearning scheme has two main aims. The first is to ensure that all of our students achieve their personal best by providing the opportunities to learn independently, collaboratively and creatively in a way which engages and motivates them. The second aim is to prepare all students for life and work in the 21st Century.

The iPad scheme is about giving teachers the opportunities to produce learning experiences for every single student that will engage, support and challenge them to perform to the very best of their ability. Technology has now reached a level of development with regards to functionality, reliability and affordability which can revolutionise learning for our students. It is not about an iPad per se, but about a device that can best meet our learning objectives. We also believe we will be doing our students a great disservice if we do not embrace modern day technologies.

For further information regarding our iPad Provision Programme, please visit the Parent Portal. Details of the Parent Portal will be sent to you separately to enable you to log in. We ask that every family creates an account on the portal and chooses one of three options: iPad Opt-in, iPad Opt-out or iPad Daily Loan. iPads will be distributed to those who have signed up for the scheme on **the first day in school – Tuesday 7**th **September.**



iPads are for learning and we value them for their educational potential. Our expectations regarding iPad Use are included in the Parental Consents Booklet. It should also be noted that students will not have access to the App Store and the device that your son/daughter will receive will have FaceTime and Messenger disabled. In addition, parents may want to know that students are not permitted to use their iPads at break and lunchtimes, unless the weather is particularly inclement. This allows students to 'have a rest' from using technology and also gives them the opportunity to socialise and interact in more 'traditional ways'.

Tutors and Subject Teachers

On entry into Year 7, students are placed into 11 mixed ability tutor groups. They will be registered once a day in these groups. For academic teaching, students will follow most aspects of the curriculum in their tutor group, but some regrouping will take place for some practical subjects. All students are placed in a Band to learn either French/Spanish. If there is a very specific reason you would like your child to study a particular language please contact Mrs Varley who will forward your wish to Mrs Purnell, Head. However, please be aware that it may not always be possible to grant your request. (Deadline for such requests is Monday 7th June)

Marking, Assessment & Reporting

Students are regularly assessed in most subjects to ensure that work is appropriate to their needs, to check on progress made and to allow us to report to parents. You can expect the following communications within an academic year:

- 'Progress Tracking' information will be sent home on a termly basis, one of which will be a full 'Report'
- An opportunity to meet your son/daughter's group tutor in October (non-academic)
- A school report (April/Spring term)
- A Parents' Evening in May/June

If you have any concerns about progress you may, of course, contact your child's tutor, or subject staff, at any point throughout the academic year.

Home Learning

The purpose of Independent Learning is to develop in students a sense of responsibility for organising their own work schedule, to consolidate and extend their class work, prepare for the next piece of work. Various kinds of home learning may be set consisting, for instance, of writing, reading, learning, researching, practical tasks or longer term project work. Parents will have access to each subject's independent learning guidance and projects at the start of the school year — these will be located on the school website under Parent Information.

Parents are encouraged to:

- provide a reasonably peaceful, suitable place in which students can do their work, or encourage students to attend homework clubs or our library. Our school library is open until 4.00pm every day and students are encouraged to access computers, books and support there.
- make it clear to students that they value independent learning and support the school in explaining how it can help them make progress in school.
- encourage students and praise them when they have completed work or study.
- expect deadlines to be met and check that they are.

All home learning will be recorded on Class Charts so parents can support and monitor home learning

Inclusive Learning

Our aim is to ensure that all students have equal opportunities to succeed, both within the academic curriculum and socially. Where there are specific learning needs, our Inclusive Learning team will ensure that the needs of those students are addressed. They will continue to work closely with all relevant agencies including Bradford, and the School Nurse, to ensure Special Needs students settle happily into the school and achieve their potential. Members of the team will be working with staff from our feeder primary schools. However, if parents have any immediate concerns, they must contact the SEND team using inclusivelearning@ilkleygs.co.uk

Religious Education

The law gives parents the right to withdraw their children from collective acts of worship and/or RE lessons. We respect that right but would ask that you make an appointment with Mr Andrew Calvert or Head of Year to discuss the matter first.

Relationships and Sex Education

As an II-18 comprehensive school, we have a responsibility to prepare students adequately for adult life. The curriculum endeavours to ensure that every child is offered a continuing programme of personal, social, citizenship and health education, which includes a relationship and a sex education component.

Through this programme we teach the basic facts of human reproduction and also encourage students to consider personal morality in relation to sexuality. Strong emphasis is placed on building positives

relationships. In addition, students are encouraged to make reasoned and responsible decisions about situations that they will face as adolescents and indeed as adults.

The programme also tries to ensure that they understand those aspects of the law relating to sexual activity and the responsibilities of parenting. Parents have the right to withdraw their children from sex education classes, but we would ask that you discuss this with Mr Andrew Calvert or Head of Year, before a decision is made.

Extra-Curricular and Enrichment Activities

We very much hope that there is far more to school than the time a student spends in the classroom. The school provides a very wide range of extra-curricular and enrichment opportunities from clubs and activities at lunchtime to after school to trips and visits in term time and the holidays. Whether you are sporty, musical, artistic, dramatic, and keen on literature or chess there is something for you. The highlights of the year are undoubtedly the Learning Community Team Building day at Nell Bank in September (cost approximately £15) and Challenge and Celebration Week in July (cost approximately £150).

Additional music lessons are also available via our tuition service 'Note-ability'.

Extra-curricular activities and enrichment opportunities are a great way to have fun and make new friends, so what are you waiting for? Get involved!

Year 7 Curriculum Overview

Below is an outline of the subjects studied in Year 7.

In **Art** we encourage students to be creative whilst developing a strong foundation of basic art skills that they can build upon as they progress further into KS3 and beyond. In term 1 students explore drawing, developing their observational skills using 2D materials including pencil, pen, charcoal and photography. In term 2 we focus on 3D design and clay work, students learning to build pots using the coiling and slabbing techniques, culminating in designing and making their own pot in response to a design brief. In term 3 students explore a greater range of art mediums including collage, colour theory and watercolour. Throughout the year students will learn about relevant artists and crafts people, using these to inspire the development of their own artwork. Home learning reinforces understanding that is taking place in lessons. During the course of the year all students take part in an independent art homework project based around a theme, allowing students greater freedom to develop and express their own ideas and work in a way that suits their interests and expertise.

In **History** we aim to develop the skills needed to study the past in a critical and effective manner, whilst developing a detailed knowledge and understanding of the topics and periods studied. Year 7 is used as an introduction to the subject specific skills and lays the foundation for students' future study. Students begin their studies with an investigation of 'The Bodies in the Field', which introduces them to the concepts and methodology of the discipline. They follow this with a study of life in Ancient Rome, looking at key features of Roman society, forming judgements about the extent to which life in Ancient Rome was amazing. Students then study life in Medieval England, considering whether life was "nasty, brutish and short". This is followed by a student-led enquiry into life in the Aztec World. We then approach history in a thematic manner, looking at how attitudes towards Crime and Punishment have changed over time. Student, make use of their historic knowledge to make judgements about our modern day attitudes towards punishments and criminals.

Geography is intended to introduce the subject to those of differing experience and charge students with an enthusiasm for the subject. This year focusses on knowledge and understanding of the world and the variations within it. In term one we look at the world, countries and continents to ensure students are aware of the global view and build a base for future conversations on place. We then look at more specific map work skills using ordnance survey maps and understanding how they can represent a vast amount of information. We then move on to examine the continent of Africa in more detail and the variety of life which exists on this continent. Students are encouraged to learn about the human and physical characteristics of Africa. Term 2 continues the study of Africa and then moves to a more local scale by studying site and settlement and the factors that affect location plus the idea of settlement hierarchy. This also involves looking at Ilkley and its site and function throughout time. Term 3 involves the investigation of rubbish and the global rubbish problem with consideration of resources and the 3R.s (Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle). Students will then end the year by completing an independent study, One Month around the UK, where they acquire a greater knowledge and appreciation of places in the UK.

In **RE** we start by going back to the beginning. We look at how religion developed through ancient ideas, death rites and the worship of gods and goddesses in ancient Greece. We then look at the Abrahamic faiths and make links between the practices and beliefs of Judaism, Christianity and Islam.

Citizenship is studied in one lesson a cycle. Students start by exploring skills such as making friends and developing new relationships. The aim of lessons is to help all students settle into their new life at Ilkley Grammar School a little more easily. This is quickly followed by units which focus on individual rights and responsibilities and how they might fit into the wider community. Ideas of democracy, health, personal identity and personal safety are also explored to give students a good grounding and help them develop further as citizens in the local, national and global community.

The **Drama** curriculum for Year 7 is designed to engage students in learning in and through the art form. Students are equipped with basic skills in structuring and performing drama which they then explore how to manipulate. The aims are to inspire creativity and team work. Each scheme builds on the previous one, challenging students to make conscious choices and to work in a range of groups to achieve their intended outcomes.

English aims to develop our students' skills in reading, writing and speaking and listening, in order to ensure effective communication in the 21st century. Many analytical and creative activities are built around the study of novels, play texts and media texts. Students are challenged to build thinking skills and group discussion skills through various group orientated tasks. For those who enjoy writing, we run a creative writing club every week, with plenty of opportunities to enter competitions.

Computing is an exciting 21st century course that prepares students to become independent and discerning users of technology. This course allows our students to acquire and apply creative and technical skills, knowledge and understanding of IT and Computer Science in a range of contexts. Students will study discrete Computing with one of our subject specialists for two lessons per cycle. Students study a variety of topics including e-safety, web design, spread sheets, programming, animation, photography and video editing.

MFL is an exciting and vibrant learning experience from the outset in Year 7. Students study either Spanish or French which is an even split down the year group. Some students arrive with different levels of acquisition of either Spanish or French yet all are catered for with a rollercoaster ride through the basics of either language. Teaching is kinaesthetic, interactive and technology based with use of iPads, games and song in the first term to get students to a high standard of speaking, reading, writing and listening within the first few months. We also aim to increase cultural awareness via Languages festival week, European day of languages. students will be given the opportunity to acquire the other language later on at the beginning of year 9 when they make their first option choices.

Mathematics in Year 7 follows a newly developed, connected curriculum that illustrates to students the links between topics within mathematics and develops their reasoning and problem-solving skills. The main aim is to develop students' fundamental understanding by using a wide range of representations, encouraging discussion and highlighting the importance of mathematical language. Opportunities for going beyond the curriculum include a weekly lunchtime Strategy Games Club and the UK Mathematical Trust Maths Challenge. Mathematics classes are set according to ability, however frequent testing and teacher recommendation allows regular set changes to be made if necessary.

Music thrives at IGS and the opportunities for Year 7 students are many. We have a fantastic, inclusive programme of extra-curricular activities and a skilled team of peripatetic teachers providing instrumental and vocal tuition to individuals and small groups. In the classroom the Elements of Music are studied using iPads, computer software, keyboards, guitar, singing and classroom percussion. Every student learns how to play the keyboard in a differentiated, personalised course. The guitar is used to learn chords and harmony as every student is given the opportunity to progress at a pace which matches their ability. Students are encouraged to bring their own instrumental and vocal expertise to the lessons and tasks are tailored to individual needs. Students will also learn how to create music using sophisticated software as used in the top studios all over the world.

Physical Education offers Year 7 a wide range of experiences through the a variety of different sports including: netball; hockey, rounders; tennis; football, rugby, basketball; cricket; swimming; gymnastics; cross-country and athletics. Students work co-operatively together in mixed ability groupings, analysing performances, acting as sports' leaders and competing as a team in small sided games. Lessons are active, challenging and fun. After school clubs enable students to develop their skills further in a more competitive situation competing in local, county and national competitions.

Year 7 Science aims to build on the knowledge, understanding and skills developed at KS2. Year 7 students will explore natural phenomena, such as forces and chemical reactions as well as learn more about living things such as animals and plants.

Practical work plays a significant role in how students learn in science and it is embedded throughout the course. Students will develop the skills necessary to be exceptional scientists: from preparing their own microscope slides, using Bunsen burners and handling chemicals to developing their own practical experiments and analysing data. We also offer an extra-curricular club where scientific topics and experiments can be studied in greater detail.

Food Technology Students in Year 7 study Food Technology for half the year which equates to two lessons during each fortnightly cycle. This is an exciting, practically based course which aims to develop food skills and knowledge. Students will study a range of areas covering hygiene and safety, use of the cooker, healthy eating and the 'eat well guide'. In addition, students will complete practical work covering a range of skills. Students are expected to provide the ingredients for the practical work which they can collect and bring home at the end of the school day.

Textiles Technology is a most enjoyable and challenging course which aims to cover both the practical and theoretical elements of the manufacturing process in producing a textile product. Students are expected to learn aspects of safety, how to use the sewing machine and iron, technical vocabulary, and to increase their independent learning as they produce their "Juggling kit".

Product Design includes 'The Racing Car Project' which provides students with the chance of working in a competitive team whilst enjoying the thrills and spills of making an electrical Racing Car. The Game in the Box project introduces students to traditional wood working, computer aided design and the industrial technique of injection moulding. Students are led through a series of 'design and make' exercises in order to complete a high quality product whilst learning about a designer's environmental responsibility.
