Subject groups, sectors and pathways

As you start to consider what subjects you want to study at Post-16 you will realise that to choose the right subjects you will also need to think about what you are interested in doing Post-18 and beyond.

Most of you will still be uncertain about what career you want to pursue and will therefore be uncertain about your subject choices. This is very common and the options process starts early to give you time to make an informed decision and to think about some of those 'big picture', 'longer term' plans.

Here are some useful principles to help you get started with your decision-making:

- 1. Identify what subjects you enjoy most
- 2. Identify your preferred learning style and mode of assessment: This may lead you to practical subjects, ones which involve coursework, essay-based subjects or a balance of all three.
- 3. Talk to trusted people around you parents/carers/adults out of school and/or adults at school such as your tutor or Mrs Mitchell (karen.Mitchell@ilkleygs.co.uk)
- 4. Identify sectors that interest you: Even if you are not sure what job you want in the future it can be helpful to identify a 'sector' which interests you. You will see that in most cases (medicine is a notable exception) you are not limited to a specific set of subjects but you will find some subjects which are 'typically' be studied in a particular sector and need to think that through carefully.
- 5. Identify your preferred Post-18 <u>pathway</u>: It is helpful if you can identify a Post-18 pathway. At IGS there are 3 main pathways: University, apprenticeship and work.
