AIM

- to develop interest in, and enthusiasm for, history

- to improve as effective and independent students and as critical and reflective thinkers with curious and enquiring minds
- to develop the ability to ask relevant and significant questions about the past and to research them
- to acquire an understanding of the nature of historical study, for example that history is concerned with judgements based on available evidence and that historical judgements are provisional
- to develop the use and understanding of historical terms, concepts and skills
- to make links and draw comparisons within and/or across different periods and aspects of the past
- to organise and communicate historical knowledge and understanding in different ways, arguing a case and reaching substantiated judgements

WHERE NEXT?

History is a highly valued subject applicable to many Higher Education studies. The Russell Group Universities refer to History as a "facilitating" subject. These subjects are required more often than others when applying for University and provide students with a wide range of options. A Level History provides students with the discipline and necessary skills to continue their studies in a broad range of degrees and High Education routes.

Students considering careers in law, politics, journalism, curating, media, research, armed services or civil services should be encouraged to study history. However, it is a very broad subject and people with history qualifications follow many different career paths.

In recent year students have been successful in their final examination, achieving pleasing grades. This has allowed students to continue their studies to a higher level.
