



Wolf Hall by Hilary Mantel

Mantel allows the key events of Tudor history - notably Henry VIII's divorce from Catherine of Aragon - to unfold through his eyes. Mantel's Cromwell emerges as a force for progress at a time when a recognisably modern British identity was established




War and Peace by Leo Tolstoy

Tolstoy's 1869 novel - often described as the greatest ever - chronicles the effects of the Napoleonic wars on five aristocratic Russian families. The narrative moves seamlessly between characters and scenes, charting in harrowing detail the chaos of war.



The Regeneration Trilogy by Pat Barker

This is the story of psychiatrist William Rivers and his pioneering treatment of various First World War soldiers - including Siegfried Sassoon and Wilfred Owen - for shell shock at the Craiglockhart war hospital near Edinburgh. Barker blends fact and make-believe to create an absorbing drama that takes in many themes besides war.



The Pillars of the Earth by Ken Follett.

Follett's The Pillars of the Earth follows Philip, a devoted monk, who joins forces with Tom, a talented builder, to undertake the most ambitious project either has ever set themselves to. In a world in turmoil, however, their journey will not be a smooth one. The first book in Ken Follett's series, The Kingsbridge Novels, this historical saga is one to get lost in.



The Invention of Curried Sausage by Uwe Timm

Timm details the fictionalized invention of curried sausage in Germany, as well as describing life in Hamburg in post-war Germany. The story follows an unnamed journalist seeking to track down the recipe of curried sausage he had when he was a child.




Revolutionary Russia, 1891-1991 by Orlando Figes.

The Cold War by John Lewis Gaddis




Fifth Sun by Camilla Townsend

figures of European stereotypes.




The Anarchy by William Dalrymple


