

FICTION:


Mary coin by Marisa Silver Dorothea Lange's Migrant

Feast Your Eyes, Myla Goldberg Feast Your Eyes tells the story of Lillian, who after discovering photography as a teenager, moves to New York in 1955. When a gallery exhibits partially nude photographs of Lillian and her daughter. Lillian is arrested, and must fight for her photography to be recognised as an artform.






Photography, Tom Ang




Ansel Adams, Ansel Adams and Mary Street Alinder


