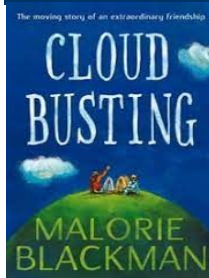

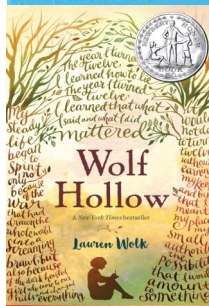
Cloud Busting, Malorie Blackman

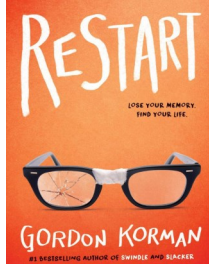
Wonder, R.J. Palacio

This book is an emotional, important tale of a 10-year-old boy with 'mandibulofacial dysostosis' or 'Treacher-Collins syndrome' – or in plain English 'rare facial birth disfigurement'. Auggie has had 27 operations, yet his first foray into school life, having been home educated to this point, isn't so much about what he looks like ("Whatever you're thinking, it's probably worse") and more about how people react to him. At Beecher Prep he meets both with cruelty and bullying and with acceptance and kindness



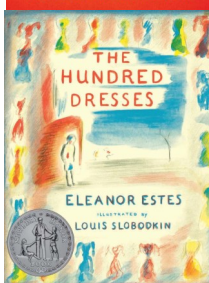
Wolf Hollow, Lauren Wolk

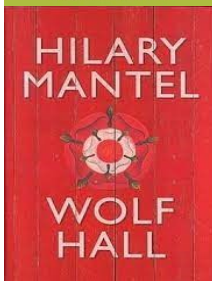
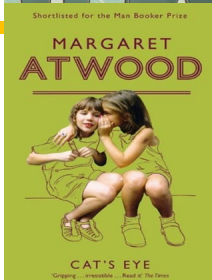
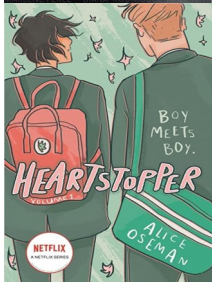

Cat's Eye, Margaret Atwood

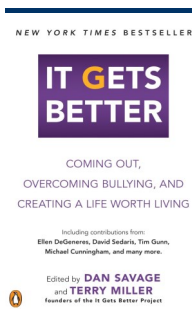

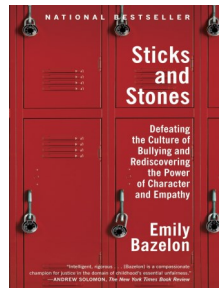

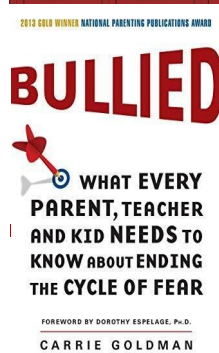


It Gets Better: Coming Out, overcoming bullying, and creating a life worth living

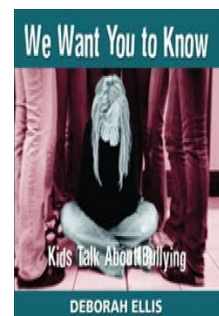
Sticks and stones, Emily Bazelon
