We hope that families had a restful and enjoyable break and that those celebrating Easter were able to find joy and meaning in this special time in the Christian calendar. This week we have been delighted to welcome everyone back to school for the start of the summer term. With two bank holidays, this is our shortest half-term of the academic year at just 23 school days! However, it's also one of the most action-packed - our transition programme for students joining us in September gets into full swing with a series of IGS Roadshows at local primary schools, GCSE, AS, and A level students begin their external exams, and our year 10 students complete their mocks. We're incredibly proud of the effort and commitment our students have shown so far and, as the exam season fast approaches, we're confident that they will all continue to focus and strive towards achieving their Personal Best.

Before the Easter break, we also received two SSAT Educational Outcomes Awards, recognising outstanding performance in both progress and attainment in 2024. These accolades are another positive testament to the hard work and dedication of IGS students and the unwavering support of our committed staff.



This national recognition is another proud moment we can all celebrate together as a school community. As we begin this busy and exciting term, we're inspired by everything that has already been accomplished at IGS and even more energised by what lies ahead. The summer term is packed with opportunities for our students to shine, including several sports finals, the Lexus Ilkley Tennis Tournament where IGS students once again take on the prestigious role of ball crew, and the much-anticipated Next Steps Week for year 12 students.

We are also looking forward to RED Day (Respect, Equality and Diversity), the Year 11 Prom, Year 11–12 Transition Day, the Creative Arts Festival, Languages Festival, Year 10 Mock Interviews, and a host of important transition events for our incoming year 7 students, including Discovery Days and Transition Day. We will also be welcoming new staff through our induction programme and rounding off the summer term with the ever-popular Challenge and Celebration Week.

In addition, I hope to provide an exciting update on the School Rebuilding Programme in the next edition of the bulletin. A planning decision is expected by the end of this month, and if all goes to plan, building work will commence later this term.





Year 10 Speak Out Challenge Assembly Final 2025

IGS ASSEMBLY FINAL 2025

On Wednesday 23rd April, five year 10 students took to the BHall stage to deliver a 3-minute speech on a topic of their choice to an audience of over 300.

Darius Cizmas, Sophie Mydlowski, Tholi Ghale, Mia Fisher and Sofi Bender were the five students who had been chosen as finalists in the event following a day of training delivered to 60 year 10 students by the Speakers Trust in February.

For the assembly final, the students had to prepare and learn a 1.5 - 3 minute speech, on a topic dear to their heart, with a positive message. A team of six judges; Ms Claughton, Ms Booth, Mrs Pymar, Mrs Griffiths and two newly appointed members of the new Post-16 Student Leadership Team, Head Student Maiya Gowon and Deputy Head Student Xanthe Gutch (who had previously participated in the competition) made notes during each speech, scoring each one out of 80 across four different categories: content, delivery, structure and positive impact.


Darius began by giving a thought-provoking speech on the topic of technology, speaking of its benefits to civilisation as well as its risks and using the image of a wheel to illustrate brilliantly how this simple device can both bring food to our doors, yet also roll tanks to the front line in a war.

Sophie asked the audience to imagine what a dancer would look like in our mind's eye and asked us to challenge stereotypes but also to consider all the hard work and practice that goes on in the background to prepare for a performance.

when living in Nepal while going to the toilet outside! He captured everyone's attention with this powerful image and then moved on to talk about the serious issue of Human/Wildlife Conflict which leads to the injury and death of many humans and animals each year.

The last speaker of the morning was Sofi who spoke incredibly powerfully of her experience of being woken up on the morning she had to flee Ukraine on the first day of the war. In a deeply thought-provoking and personal speech about resilience she spoke, quoting the writer Haruki Murakami, of how all storms will pass in the end.

This was a fitting speech on which to end an impressive set of performances from a group of students who several weeks ago, had never spoken in public to a large audience before.



It was a privilege for the staff and students in the audience of over 320 people to listen to these five thoughtprovoking and hugely varied speeches. All students will receive certificates as the five assembly finalists, with the winner and runner up being Sofi Bender and Tholi Ghale. Sofi (with Tholi as the reserve) will now be put forward to represent IGS, and will hopefully be selected to deliver her speech at the regional final in Leeds in July, receiving an afternoon of specialist public speaking training to compete in the final stage of the competition.

Both the Spanish and the French groups also got a taste of what a day in school is like with students joining their partners for a day of lessons. This year, perhaps more than any other, there was much to reflect on regarding these long-standing partnerships with our European friends, when our students and their families are able to both celebrate and enjoy differences, whilst being reminded of how much our countries and cultures have in common and of the values that we share.

IGS Y9 Livigno Ski trip 5th-12th April 2025

In the first week of the Easter holidays, 52 Year 9 students and 5 staff departed for Livigno, in the Italian Alps in Lombardy. The base of the resort sat at 1,816 metres above sea level (the highest point at 2,950m) with the altitude giving promise of good snow late in the ski season. Livigno will be one of the host ski regions for the 2026 Milan-Cortina Winter Olympics!



The group was made up of a mix of seasoned skiers, intermediates, and many beginners. It was incredibly rewarding to see so many

beginners being afforded their first taste of skiing and make excellent progress throughout the week, tackling red runs by the end of the week. The ski bug certainly spread quickly! The IGS Ski squad enjoyed three ski regions in the Livigno resort over their 6 days skiing with their instructors from 'New Ski School Livigno'. We visited San Rocco, Val Andrea and Mottolino. Each beautiful ski region was enjoyed with beautiful bluebird sky backdrops and we were extremely lucky to have such favourable weather.





In the evenings, we enjoyed a varied Après ski entertainment programme after carbo-loading at the exceptional Hotel Margherita. Our hospitality and catering there was fantastic. Our evening activities included an interactive quiz in Livigno, the Gameshow Challenge, bowling and an awards night!

The 52 year 9 students on the trip were a true delight, their behaviour was exemplary, and they represented IGS with Pride. The group received praise from the hotel, ski school and tour reps. The

skiing progress and personal development was truly remarkable on many levels.

Success at the English Schools National Cross-Country Finals!



On Saturday 15th March, five year 7 runners from Ilkley Grammar School made the long journey down to Coventry to compete in the **English Schools National Cross-Country Finals**. Having gone through several qualifying events to be able to represent West Yorkshire against the best runners from other counties, all five of our students gave a fantastic account of themselves and, in representing IGS and West Yorkshire.

Harriet Carter ran first in the year 7 girls race. Despite getting caught in the mid-pack of runners at the start, Harriet bravely made her way through the field and closed the race with her trademark



sprint finish. Harriet finished 7th out of 135 of some of England's best crosscountry runners. A well-deserved and magnificent achievement.

Next to race was the year 7 boys. Of the six runners in the West Yorkshire team, four were made up of Ilkley Grammar School boys, a testament to the strength of the running teams at IGS.

In another tough field of 124 runners and, some of the best runners in the country, our IGS runners ran an incredible race. Max Brett finished 13th, Seb Ford

29th, Thomas Greenwood 56th, and Robert Brooks 106th. All boys contributed to West Yorkshire finishing as the 4th placed county at the National Cross-Country Finals.

For our older runners, the **English Schools Cross-Country Championships** took place all the way down in West Sussex at Ardingly Showground on Saturday 15th March. Eight IGS pupils qualified to represent West Yorkshire schools, which is a great achievement in itself. Charlie Porteous and Robert Carter ran for the Junior Boys, Matilda Irvine and Jake Norris for the Senior teams.

The Senior Boys' team were the last race of the day, and they certainly made it worth the wait! There were 28 starting teams, over a fast and brutal course and our boys rose to the challenge with Archie Budding managing to get a great start. Archie held on for an individual 7th place with his teammates (Otis Brooks, Owen Ashdown and Alex Wolfenden) not far behind, cumulating in a 3rd position team finish. What a phenomenal achievement for these boys - making the

podium at a national event amongst some of the strongest independent schools in the country. Well done to all our amazing runners and thank you to all the parents and staff who came to support us on the day.

Ilkley Grammar School and the local running clubs are incredibly proud of their achievement and look forward to seeing them run for IGS and West Yorkshire in years to come!




